

Tinfoil hats are scary

(but the fact that we may actually need them is even scarier)

Recently, on the ABA's Solosez Listserv, a discussion started about whether attorneys could still use cloud-based services, in light of the many revelations regarding the NSA's monitoring. Part of the discussion focused on client confidences, and how secret they really were. The conclusion was, in part, that it depended on your practice area.

Let's backtrack a bit to what we know - the NSA has been collecting data on phone records, although apparently not recording calls. It has also been collecting e-mails, both the metadata and the actual e-mails, although the claim is that not all e-mails have been collected, and that the system collects e-mails within a certain number of degrees of separation (3, if you believe the NSA) of people who meet certain criteria, including contacts out of the country. There have been several known abuses of the collection for personal use, but all of these have been self-reported. Information learned through the information-gathering program has been shared with at least one other country (Israel).

While there has been no solid information regarding sharing of information between US agencies, there are rumors. Therefore, the practitioners who should be most concerned with e-mail/cloud security are those who try cases in which the U.S. is an adverse party - criminal and immigration law practitioners.

It is important to remember that there is a tenet of attorney-client privilege (in many places) that in order to maintain that privilege, the attorney and client must attempt to keep that communication secret. Therefore, if they think that they are having a private conversation, but the police are listening in without telling anyone, then privilege may still exist. Here, you may be able to maintain that privilege if the government attempted to use the communications directly. Instead, the threat is that they will use information learned and shared illegally to then set up the investigation - to credit a confidential informant and get the warrant for the storage locker, or to otherwise find the incriminating evidence that they need.

Another cause for concern is in civil matters. Because there is evidence that NSA employees have misused data collected for personal reasons, any case, where the adverse party has a connection to (not just is, but maybe is related to, or close friends with) an NSA employee, may result in issues with confidentiality. While not all employees at the NSA should be painted with the same "you're spying on me" brush, prudence requires caution.

So what should attorneys do? US mail, while monitored, is most likely not being read, and therefore may remain secure. Face to face meetings (where letters to file can be exchanged if necessary) are also still a viable option, and in fact may be the safest option. Before any of this started, I was already warning clients that e-mail might not be secure, simply because someone else could open it on the computer.

In reality, as we adjust to this new paradigm, attorneys will need to rethink how they communicate with clients. We will all need to determine our comfort levels, and those of our clients. In the meantime, I am sure that we will all be watching the developments.

Mobile Security is Scary for Some

When people ask me (not that they ever do) what's the scariest thing in Android, I often reply, "the number of people not using security."

The truth is, there are a number of attorneys out there who disregard -- hopefully just forget -- their duty to protect client data and information. Of course, that isn't you because you're taking every necessary precaution to have satisfactory systems of protection.

Here are 3 ways you need to beef up your scary security:

- 1. Activate Android Device Manager. ADM is a recent addition to the Android ecosystem that puts Android devices on par with Apple's "Find My iPhone" feature. ADM offers 3 core security systems: remote wipe, locate, and lock. Should you be the unfortunate bimbo to lose your phone, ADM will hopefully help you to find it again, while providing a platform for security. You can activate ADM through the Google Settings app. Check out this post for the full rundown.
- 2. **Set a strong password**. There's far too little emphasis on the essential need for strong password protection on your mobile device. I've seen too many phones with "1-1-1-1" as the unlock password. It doesn't take a genius to crack that code. Your device's password should be a random assortment of at least 8 characters,

numbers, and symbols. Here's more information on setting super-strong passwords.

3. Don't be a "goofus" when dealing with apps. Android is a naturally secure mobile operating system if you do your part. Android features a sandboxing system that prevents apps from acting outside of their intended and allowable functions. These limitations are prescribed in the app's permissions. Read the app permissions anytime you install or update an application. If you're not comfortable with granting the app permission for a purpose, don't install the app. Yes, that includes those apps even your best buddy recommends.

If you'll follow these three pieces of advice, your time on your mobile device won't be a scary experience.

Ramping Up Productivity With Evernote

You have probably heard of Evernote, its experienced explosive-growth and become widely used over the past few years by many attorneys. Whether you have heard of Evernote or not, the best way to learn how to use it is by seeing examples how it is used. Evernote is all about productivity. While Evernote launched with a slogan of "remember everything" at this point it is more appropriately characterized as "organize everything efficiently."

For lawyers, to which *time* really is **money**, Evernote is gold. Why is it so effective? One reason is that it is multi-platform; that means you can use on just about any device you have - desktop computer, laptop computer, smartphone, tablet, iPad or any web browser you can access or any operating system - PC, Mac, Android or iOS it matters not.

As a starting point, consider these ways I use Evernote to be more productive:

1. Organize your legal research.

I use Evernote to gather and organize legal research that I find both in law-specific software (e.g., Westlaw) and the Web at-large. I email and copy and paste the results into Evernote and create notes that track everything from multiple sources. In addition to legal research, this works well for simply researching a product or service you are thinking of purchasing. Evernote has plugins for most browsers that allow you to send web pages and links directly to it. For a more sophisticated approach to using Evernote for legal research consider Ben Carter's article here.

Making notes.

I make notes about clients, about cases, about doctor's appointments etc. I make the note on whatever device is handy (computer, tablet, phone) and then it syncs across all my devices. It is just "there" when I need it without having to think about it. Evernote's built in voice dictation software and most mobile device's voice-recognition increase the ease of inputting information on-the-go.

3. Creating and managing checklists.

Checklists are the backbone of any solid and consistent repeatable process. Evernote provides an easy way to generate checklists and manage them. The Evernote Blog provides detailed and relatively simple steps for using Evernote as a checklist machine. 4. Create to do Lists.

Evernote is my primary to-do list maker. To spruce things up a bit, I use the check-box images to create items that I can actually "check-off" as I complete them. The nifty thing is I can add to the "to do" list as things come to my mind, regardless of where I am. The to-do lists can be categorized and tagged for easy organization and searching. With the recent addition of "reminders", Evernote for to-do lists are even better.

My short list of Evernote uses is but a snap shot of the hundreds of ways people are using the program to be more productive.

The coolest feature that connects all of these items is *omnipresence*: because Evernote is everywhere, whatever you put into Evernote is always right there within your grasp. That note you made while leaving the courthouse? It is synced and shows up on your desktop computer back at your office automatically.
